American Chestnut Restoration:

The Life, Death and Rebirth of the American Chestnut in the Eastern Forest

The Topic

More than a century ago, nearly four billion American chestnut trees were growing in the forests of the eastern U.S. In the early 1900s, a blight fungus introduced on plants from Asia spread throughout the range and killed an estimated 4 billion American chestnuts. The chestnut blight has been called the greatest ecological disaster to strike the world's forests in all of history.

This presentation will review the history of the American chestnut, and describe the latest scientific approaches being used to breed a genetically diverse, locally adapted blight-resistant American chestnut to be re-established as a keystone species in the eastern forest.

One Health

One Health is the trans-disciplinary approach that works locally, regionally, nationally, and globally to attain optimal well-being for people and society, the environment and plants and animals. Together, the three major components make up the One Health triad, and the well-being of each is inextricably linked to the others in the triad.
